## English

The children were introduced to the text we are going to use in our English lesson - Stone Age Boy by Satoshi Kitamura. We looked at the cover and read the blurb. We tried to guess what the book could be about. The children were asked to predict the story in their books. This book fits in well
 with our history topic of The Stone Age.

## Music

The children seem to have enjoyed their first lesson with Mr Jaggard, although some children were unsure about what to expect during the first session of learning a musical instrument!

## PE

We played a whole class team game during our PE lesson. I called the game 'Frozen trees', but the children told me that it had the same rules as 'Stuck-in-the-mud'. The idea of the game was to develop evading skills, whilst defending other classmates. The children had great fun during this activity.

In science, we studied how food is grouped based on the nutrients they provide us. Each food group is essential for us to grow and remain healthy. We discussed the importance of each of these groups for our bodies.

For the class activity, the children were asked to work in small groups. They discussed what they had learnt and organised common everyday food items into correct food groups on a large sheet of paper.


## Maths

This week in maths, we have been learning representation of numbers up to a thousand, partitioning numbers to a thousand and flexibly partitioning numbers to a thousand. Although all children were able to represent and partition numbers to one thousand, they found partitioning flexibly a bit tricky. We will revisit this concept in the future to consolidate their learning.

4 times (we will learn doubling numbers to help us with this)
8 times (doubling answers to 4 times tables)
6 times
9 times
7 times
12 times
Mixed times
This is not set in stone. If your child prefers to learn them in a different order, that is perfectly fine. This is the order in which I prefer teaching them.
