Year 5 Newsletter

Dear Parents

Welcome to Year 5! It has been a great start to the academic year and I have been very impressed by how well the children have settled down to work and got used to the new routines.

At the end of this letter, I have attached the curriculum overview for this term. This gives a good idea of the areas of learning that we will be covering. This week we began our history topic, The Tudors, which will continue until Christmas. The children found out about gruesome punishments for Tudor crimes and about Tudor cures for illnesses. Where possible, English lessons will relate to the topic too. In English this week, we started to read a book set in Tudor times called 'A Pig Called Henry.' The children compared some aspects of life for a Tudor child with life for us today. The children also wrote a recipe to cure a Tudor disease.

In maths, the children read, wrote and ordered numbers to 100,000, determined the value of each digit in a number and worked on Roman numerals. In RE, the children considered qualities that people may believe God has, and whether or not humans could possess the same qualities. In art, the children created some super self-portraits, to be displayed outside our classroom.

PE lessons will always take place on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. We had one tag rugby lesson this week and played a game of handball in the other. The children clearly love PE!

<u>Home learning</u>

The children have all been given a reading journal. Reading remains the most important home learning and the children should read every day. **Please encourage your child to read and to record their reading in their journal, which will be checked in school daily.** It is also essential for the children to have instant recall of multiplication and division facts, up to 12 x 12. Please help your child to practise their tables regularly. Spellings will be given each week and tests will take place on Fridays. Words to learn for next Friday's test have been sent home today. Usually, an additional home learning task will be set, but this week we will

concentrate on reading, times tables practice (which can be done on TTRockstars) and learning spellings.

Teacher of the Week

Each Thursday, one child will have the opportunity to be the teacher for **up to 20 minutes**. The child can choose any subject that interests them to share with the class. 'Lessons' should be prepared in advance and **may** include a PowerPoint presentation, some interesting objects to look at and an interactive activity for the class to be involved in. Previous subjects have been really wide ranging, from ballet to magic, drones, cakes and optical illusions. It's a great opportunity for the children to share areas of interest and expertise, whilst demonstrating their speaking and listening skills. Children should all begin to think about what they may base their lesson on, but may not need not prepare it yet, as it will take many weeks to get through the whole class.

Year 5 Term 1 2023

PE

Our PE will focus on tag rugby and dance. PE days will be Tuesdays and Wednesdays

History and Geography

The Tudors

The children will learn about The Tudors in detail during Terms 1,2 and 3. This will start with The Battle of Bosworth, leading to finding out about Tudor Monarchs and the wives of Henry V111, then Tudor life: clothes, food, crime and punishment, diseases and cures, life for children. Life for rich and poor Tudors will be compared. Other aspects of the period will also be studied, such as Christianity, the military and culture.

Geographical study of oceans

Music

We will explore pitch, rhythm and notation Song focus: 'Livip' on a prayer'

We will listen to music composed during Tudor times.

<u>Italian</u>

The children will learn greetings, the days of the week, months and seasons, animals, the weather, colours and food.

SMSC and British Values

The children will think about 'Being Me In My World'. They will learn to face new challenges positively and learn how to set personal goals. They will consider their responsibilities as a member of their school and also learn more about their rights and responsibilities as a British Citizen.

Science

Materials and their Properties

The children will learn about different materials, their uses and their properties, as well as dissolving, separating mixtures and irreversible changes. The children will sort and classify objects according to their properties. They will also explore the properties of materials to find the most suitable material for different purposes. The children will work scientifically and collaboratively to investigate the best thermal insulator to make a lunch box, making predictions and forming conclusions.
