We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all pupils. We ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed. We believe that all pupils should benefit from the funding, regardless of their level of sporting ability. The most effective way to ensure a lasting and positive impact of the funding on PE provision throughout the school is to develop teachers' skill and confidence in the teaching of the subject.

Summary of SPG spending 2019/2020

The Sports Premium Funding this year was used to specifically support the stated aim of "encouraging the development of healthy, active lifestyles". Much attention was paid to the promotion of active before school, break and lunch times, through the provision of enhanced physical resources, play spaces and positive role models. In addition, we continued to support the development of the Physical Education curriculum, primarily through the improved provision of opportunities for outdoor and adventurous activity challenges, both individually and within a team. Our fully trained and accredited Forest Schools' Practitioner continued to develop and lead a programme of outdoor and adventurous activity challenges, which was also followed by members of the teaching staff in order for them to further develop their skills and confidence in this area, allowing them to run a Woodland Learning programme in school for the children from September 2020. We also supported existing school staff to provide an increased range of outdoor and adventurous activity challenges, throughout the course of the school day, maximising pupils' physical activity during break and lunchtimes.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, it was not possible for us to spend all of our Sports Premium funding this year. The balance of £10923.05 has been carried over to next year, when we will be able to install further outdoor equipment for the children to use during their break and lunchtimes. This will allow us to develop our use of the outdoor learning environment throughout the course of the school day, and will provide the children with a wider range of physical activities to enjoy. This is especially important at this time, when we are aiming for the children to be outdoors and to be active as much as possible, both for their mental health and as a preventative measure regarding the possible spread of COVID-19.

Future plans for PE provision:

Existing school staff to offer a range of Woodland Learning experiences, based on their Forest School sessions.

The development and resurfacing of the area behind the Key Stage 2 building, to provide an additional outdoor play area for the children.

The installation of a range of outdoor sporting resources and pieces of equipment, to be used by the children at break and lunchtimes. This equipment will include a development of our existing trim trail, along with a second wooden gazebo to support outdoor learning.

Outcomes

Feedback from pupils and staff concerning the Forest School programme has continued to develop pupils' resilience, stamina and motivation. Teachers and support staff have commented that children who have not previously enjoyed traditional PE lessons engage well with the climbing and running elements of the activities and are keen to challenge themselves. School staff feel that they now have the necessary confidence and skills to offer Woodland Learning sessions next year, building on the success of the Forest School programme.

School involvement in PASS events has increased, leading to higher numbers of pupils having access to a wider range of sporting activities.

Pupils have access to a wider choice of physical activities and resources before school, and at break and lunchtimes.

Swimming information regarding Year 6 cohort 2019-2020 (as of 06.01.2020)

Able to confidently swim 25 metres 89%

Able to swim using a range of strokes 68%

Able to self rescue 28%

Year 6 were due to have swimming lessons during Terms 3, 4 and 5. These lessons were obviously cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
